USDOT Discretionary Grant Funding Matrix

Many departments have fewer resources than they need, both in time and money. The new USDOT Discretionary Grant Funding Matrix can help with both. A simple matrix is organized first by what type of agency is eligible. With a click of a button local agencies can move straight to a matrix that matches grants with the type of project (options include planning, construction, equipment and materials, operations and maintenance, training and more). The matrix is kept updated so only grants with current notices of funding opportunities should appear.

In 2009, 56 percent of highway deaths occurred on rural roads and the fatality rate was 2.6 times higher in rural areas than in urban areas. These data underscore the need to systematically improve road safety in rural areas."

The Federal Highway Administration kicked off round six of the Every Day Counts (EDC-6) program with a Virtual Summit introducing the ready-to-deploy innovations the agency is promoting in 2021 and 2022.


EDC-6 features strategies to enhance engagement with the people who build and use the transportation infrastructure, products to save money on preserving and repairing bridges and roads, and processes to save time on project delivery and incident management. EDC-6 teams are ready to provide technical assistance and training to facilitate adoption of seven innovations:

Crowdsourcing for advancing operations helps agencies apply crowdsourced data integrated from multiple streams to optimize roadway use for reduced congestion and increased safety and reliability.

e-Ticketing and digital as-builts improve the tracking, exchange, and archiving of materials tickets and enhance the future usability of as-built plans for operations, maintenance, and asset management, which can result in increased project safety and quality.

Virtual public involvement supplements face-to-face information sharing with technology platforms that increase the variety of methods agencies use to inform the public, encourage participation, and receive input on transportation project planning and development.

Next-generation traffic incident management offers new tools, data, and training mechanisms that can help State and local agencies shorten the duration and impact of roadway incidents and enhance safety for motorists, crash victims, and responders.

Get The Picture!

Here's the situation. paving work is being done on a Two Lane Roadway with a Two-Way Turn Lane. Needing to shut down part of One Lane, the operation becomes the equivalent of a One Lane, Two Way Road. Traffic will need to be alternated by a Flagger on each end. So, what's wrong with this picture?

If you've been through our Flagger Training, I am hoping that you remember to stand on the shoulder of the road. Your safety, the safety of the crew and that of the motoring public are more important than the job being performed. In this scenario, there is no usable shoulder to stand on.

You will also remember that it is crucial to establish an escape route for possible dangerous situations. The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) states in Section 6E-08 Flagger Stations, Note 3, "The Flagger should identify an escape route that can be used to avoid being struck by an errant vehicle." In this scenario, the Flagger is standing at the curb, on a bridge section, adjacent to guardrail. If an errant vehicle fails to stop or loses control of the vehicle, how does the flagger escape? Will he jump over the guardrail into the tree line?

If you haven't been through our training, we would like to see you. Again, it is more than legal liability. It is about giving our workers tools for doing their tasks as safely as possible. It is also about keeping your family and my family safe as they traverse our work zones.
